License Consolidation

Why Consider Consolidation?

 House Joint Memorial 56 requests that the Department study the consolidation of hunting and fishing licenses and stamps for the ease of hunters and fisherman

 Report findings to the interim Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee
by November 2010

Discussion Points for Consolidation

- Reduce complexity of license purchases
- Facilitate compliance with State Laws and Rules

- Revenue impacts of consolidation
- Effective date of possible "consolidated" licenses

Current License Sales

- Average number of hunting, trapping and fishing licenses sold each year ≈ 312,000
- \$21 million annual revenue from all license sales
- In addition to the appropriate license, customers must purchase Sikes Act and HMAV stamps.

Consolidation Proposal

- Two part Proposal;
 - Over the counter (OTC) licenses
 - Special Hunts revisions

OTC

- Eliminate the Sikes Act and HMAV stamp and second rod validation as separate purchases
- Include the stamps and rod fee in the cost of each license type
- To maintain current revenue, the price of each fishing, hunting and trapping license would increase by \$6-7
- Reduces complexity and facilitates compliance with State Laws and Rules

Consolidation Proposal

Special Hunts Revision

- All applicants required to purchase a "base" license at time of application
- Base license allows applicant to hunt small game and/or fish based on their selection at time of application
- Base license issued independent of success in the special hunt lottery drawings
- Base license is valid for entire license year
- Facilitates Department's participation in the Federal Sportfish and Wildlife Restoration Funding Programs

Consolidation Proposal

- Consolidation Proposal would require a number of changes to law and rule
 - Change prices and definitions of privileges
 - Develop new base license type for nonresidents (small game and small game/fishing combination)
 - Determine pricing for non-resident licenses

Next Steps for Proposal

- Request public input regarding options
- Revise licensing options based on public input and SGC guidance
- Present initial findings and options at August SGC meeting
- Refine options as needed, present to SGC at September meeting
- Present options to the Interim Courts, Corrections and Justice Committee, by November 2010
