Operating Budget



- The budget began as HB 6 then rolled up to HB 2 failed to pass House Floor 34-34
- SB 313 (took the place of HB 2) passed both cambers signed by Governor on 3/11/14 – 6.15 Billion State Budget
- \$38,630,800 (1% decrease from current operating budget FY 14)
- Special Appropriations totaling \$860,000 (LE Vehicles-\$460K, Legal Support-\$250K, Federal Assistance upgrades-\$150K)
- Keeping all employee positions (initial LFC recommendation was to delete 20 vacant positions)
- No support from the State's General Fund for FY 2015. FY 2008 was the last year of State General Fund appropriations (around \$330,000).

HB128 Hunting & Fishing Infraction Penalties

- Sponsored by Rep. Alonzo Baldonado
- Do Pass in House Health, Government, and Indian Affairs Committee and Judiciary
- Passed House unanimously (64-0)
- Only Passed in Senate Conservation with amendment – removed section dealing with misdemeanor violations
- Session Ended was not heard in Senate Judiciary

SB157 (Companion – HB 128) Hunting & Fishing Infraction Penalties

- Sponsored by Sen. Clemente Sanchez
- Do Pass in Conservation Committee
- Tabled in Senate Judiciary Committee concerns about creating felony, misdemeanor language

WHEREAS, during extended periods of drought, beaver ponds and their associated wetlands greatly enhance the resiliency of riparian zones, including riverine plant communities and fish and wildlife populations; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Game and Fish has developed guidance for individual landowners regarding hav to relocate beaver families to their land and how to mitigate or avoid problems created by beavers already on their land; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico would benefit from a strategic plan for statewide beaver memagement designed to capture the full watershed benefits of beaver populations and manismize coreflicts with other land uses, such as agriculture and the development of transportation infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the State of Utah recently adopted a statewide beaver management plan developed in a process that involved a wide range of public and private landowners, users and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the Department of Game and Fish, the Forestry Division of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department and the State Land Office be requested to develop recommendations jointly on how New Mexico may proceed to develop a statewide be aver management plan. The recommendations should include which agency should take the lead role for development, which stakeholder groups should be included in the development and a timeline and budget; and

BEIT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Game and Fish, the Forestry Devision of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department and the State Land Office be requested to present their recommendations Jointly to the appropriate interim committee or committees by September 1, 2014; and

BEIT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the Director of the Department of Game and Fish, the Secretary of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources, that Commissioner of Public Lands and the Co-Chairs of the New Mexico Legislative Council.

A MEMORIAL

RECOGNIZING THE NEED FOR INCREASED PENALTIES FOR AND EDUCATION ABOUT TROPHY POACHING; REQUESTING THAT THE COVERNOR DECLARE A TROPHY POACHING A WARENESS DAY

WHEREAS, wildlife belongs to the citizens of New Mexico and is too precious to be wasted; and

WHEREAS, New Mexico has a long tradition of hunting, which provides food for some families, income to local communities and opportunities for tourists to enjoy the animals that roam in this unique State; and

WHEREAS, trophy poaching is the act of illegally killing an animal for the most valuable part of its body, such as its head or antlers, and leaving the rest to waste; and

WHEREAS, trophy poaching is increasing in New Mexico, is unfair to legal hunters, damaging to big game populations and leaves ferver animals for future generations to enjoy; and

WHEREAS, although only a small percentage of the population engages in trophy poaching, these individuals cause significant damage to big game animal populations by depriving them of successful genes for future generations; and

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WHEREAS, big game animals have inherent value in themselves, value to people who enjoy seeing the animals in their natural habitat and economic value as a draw of tourists and legal hunters to the State; and

WHEREAS, trophy animals poached in New Mexico include elk, bighorn sheep, oryx, ibex, Barbary sheep, deer, pronghorn antelope, javelina, bear and cougar; and

WHEREAS, existing penalties do not effectively deter trophy poaching; αnd

WHEREAS, more public education is needed about the damage that trophy poaching causes and the need for greater enforcement;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO that the importance of wildlife in the State be recognized and that the harm caused by trophy poaching be acknowledged; and


BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Game and Fish be requested to take all possible steps to deter trophy poaching; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Game and Fish be commended for proposing stiffer penalties for trophy poaching, such as making trophy poaching a fourth degree felony; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Game and Fish be requested to take steps to increase public awareness that trophy poaching is illigal and to inform the public about how to report these crimes; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Governor be requested to issue a proclamation declaring a trophy peaching awareness day to further increase public awareness of the problems associated with trophy poaching; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of this memorial be transmitted to the Governor, the Director of the Department of Game and Fish and the Chair of the State Game Commission.
