


La Joya Wildlife Area



Location: La Joya Wildlife Area is located about 20 miles north of Socorro.

Total Acreage: 3,405 acres.

Purchase: La Joya Wildlife Area was purchased in various parcels through 1940 to provide habitat for waterfowl, sandhill cranes, shorebirds, and songbirds.

Description: The La Joya Wildlife Area contains ponds, canals, drains, and crop fields along and adjacent to the Rio Grande.

Horseback Riding

August 31.

Hiking-Hiking is the best way to see wildlife at the La Joya Wildlife Area or other wildlife management areas. Allowed March 15-August 31.

Bicycling-Allowed only on established roads. Allowed March 15-August 31.

Horseback Riding-Allowed March 15-August 31.

Camping-Not allowed.

Hunting-Waterfowl hunting allowed during open seasons.

Fishing-Allowed March 15-August 31.

Closures-La Joya is closed to wildlife viewing, photographing, hiking, bicycling and horseback riding September 1-March 14.

Facilities-La Joya Wildlife Area does not have rest rooms, camp sites or drinking water.

Fees-Hunters and anglers must have appropriate licenses and permits. Wildlife viewers, photographers, hikers, and horseback riders do not need a permit or validation unless they go off open roads in which case they would need a valid license or permit. Motorized Vehicles-Not allowed off open roads.

What to See, Do, and Learn

Wildlife Viewing-Wildlife watchers may see various waterfowl, songbirds and quail. Good binoculars are important. The best time to view wildlife is at dawn or dusk. Allowed March 15-August 31.

Photographing-The best time to photograph wildlife is at dawn or dusk. A telephoto lens is important. Allowed March 15-
